

Becoming Buddies –

The Buddy Scheme at Bremen University of Applied Sciences

What is the Buddy Scheme?

The Buddy Scheme is a great opportunity:

- → to establish first contacts abroad
- → to get first-hand information about partner universities and partner cities
- → to gain interesting intercultural experiences
- → to make international friends
- → to possibly learn a new language
- \rightarrow ...and much more!

Who is the scheme for and what are the benefits?

For the incoming students of the Faculty of Business and Economics:

→ to have a person at hand who can help with questions and thus make the stay in Bremen even better

For the HSB Buddy:

- \rightarrow to build a network with students from all over the world in an intercultural context
- \rightarrow to prepare for your own semester abroad
- → to receive a certificate for their voluntary and social commitment
- → This certificate gained whilst still studying can be an important additional qualification when applying for jobs during and after their studies.

Who can become an HSB Buddy?

Experienced and committed students who, as "locals", actively help the newly arrived foreign students. Participation is possible every semester until graduation.

What are the tasks of an HSB Buddy?

The most important task as an HSB Buddy is to be a buddy for visiting students in Bremen, i.e. to support them before their arrival and during the first days and to make the start of their studies abroad easier.

Creating the "Buddy Activities" is the responsibility of the Buddy but it also offers a lot of freedom.

However, we recommend the following activities:

- → first contact before arrival by e-mail
- → pick-up from the airport (not mandatory)
- → on-site support during the first few days, i.e. for example, answering questions about life in Bremen, a tour around the city after arrival, help



with the campus tour at the HSB, taking the buddy along to parties, etc.

- → participation in the get-to-know-you meeting during the introduction week
- → participation in HSB's information session for incoming students, such as the "Buddy Treff" and all activities organized by the Local Erasmus+ Initiatives (LEI)
- → Participation in the "Farewell Ceremony" at the end of the semester

How can you become an HSB Buddy?

- 1. participation in the introductory event of the Faculty of Business and Economics. There will various dates during the semester and prior to the arrival of the incoming students. (information about the dates will be provided via HSB email)
- 2. complete the registration form (will be emailed after the event) Here preferences on country of origin and language of the buddy can be indicated.
- 3. contact information of the assigned buddy will be sent by e-mail

We will take into consideration your request and make every effort to assign a buddy to each student.

How does the HSB Buddy receive their certificate?

At the end of the semester every HSB Buddy, has the opportunity to receive a certificate for their volunteer work.

There are three requirements for this:

- 1. participation in the introductory event of the Faculty of Business Administration and Economics
- 2. preparation of the buddy statement (report on the activities and their extent with the the buddy (minimum: 30 hours per semester) All activities count, including those that took place before the arrival of the buddy, e.g. the Buddy Treff and various LEI activities.
- 3. participation in the farewell ceremony
